

MEMORANDUM ON COMMUNITY PROJECT FUNDING OFFICE OF CONGRESSMAN TONY CÁRDENAS

In addition to programmatic and language-based appropriations requests this year, the House Appropriations Committee has announced that it will also accept requests for Community Project Funding in Fiscal Year 2025. This process is a way for Members of Congress to bring direct support to their district by requesting funding that goes directly to their state or local government, or eligible non-profit recipients. These projects will be funded on a limited basis, and each Member of Congress will be able to submit 15 requests. This means that my office can only select the most competitive requests for funding that meet all guidelines. The general requirements and accounts available for requests are described below. All requests are due by **SUNDAY, APRIL 28 AT 9:00PM PST**. An application form can be filled out on my website: https://cardenas.house.gov/.

What is the difference between Programmatic and Language requests and Community Project Funding Requests?

- *Programmatic* general support or funding for a program.
- Language a request to add language to the bill or report to accompany the bill which generally does not include dollar amounts.
- Community Project Funding directs funds to a specific state or local government or eligible non-profit recipient.

This memo will only cover Community Project Funding, which must be submitted to our office through the form available on my website.

What criteria will be used to evaluate Community Project Funding requests?

- Cap on Overall Funding: The total amount for Community Project Funding in House appropriations bills will not exceed one half of one percent of discretionary spending.
- <u>Federal Nexus Requirement:</u> In order to ensure a federal nexus exists for each funded project, the
 Committee will only fund projects that are tied to a federal authorization law. Members must
 include a written statement describing the federal nexus for each Community Project Funding
 request. Subcommittee guidance will include example language Members can use to make the
 required statement.
- No Memorials, Museums, or Commemoratives: Memorials, museums, and commemoratives (i.e., projects named for an individual or entity) are not eligible for Community Project Funding. Many are eligible for competitive grants, and Members can request higher program funding levels.
- **Stewardship Requirements:** Funded projects will follow applicable requirements in the authorized programs that support good stewardship of taxpayer dollars. For example, programs may require a non-federal cost-share and participation in program audits.
- <u>Ban on For-Profit Recipients:</u> Project funding may not be directed to for-profit recipients.
 Members may request funding for State, local, or tribal governmental grantees and certain eligible non-profits, as allowed under federal law and subcommittee guidance.
 - <u>Exclusive to HUD Economic Development Initiative ("EDI")</u>: In FY 2025, only
 governmental entities and public institutions of higher education will be eligible for EDI
 projects.
- **No Financial Interest:** Members must publicly certify that they and their immediate family have no financial interest in the projects they request. "Immediate family" for this purpose includes a father, mother, son, daughter, brother, sister, husband, wife, father-in-law, or mother-in-law
- <u>Demonstrations of Project Merit and Support:</u> Members must provide evidence of the project's merit and community support.
 - Examples include:
 - Letters of support from elected community leaders (e.g. mayors or other officials)
 - Press articles highlighting the need for the requested Community Project Funding;
 - Support from newspaper editorial boards;
 - Projects listed on State intended use plans, community development plans, or other publicly available planning documents; or Resolutions passed by city councils or boards.
- <u>Audits and Oversight:</u> The Government Accountability Office (GAO) will conduct an independent audit of a sample of enacted projects and report its findings to Congress.

What projects are eligible?

Only certain accounts will be available for Community Project Funding in each subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee. For FY25, CPF was available for 34 accounts. A summary of the available subcommittees is listed below.
